Go on with your life, don't worry about falls



Portrait Of A Pioneer


Humble yourself before the Lord, and He will lift you up. James 4:10NIV

Strength of character, purposeful living and the desire to walk humbly before God and with his fellow man gave Ernest Benjamin Hodge his mantra and his identity. And therein he lived with a sense of commitment, contentment and completion throughout his life. The unfolding of this life began in Vicksburg, Mississippi where he was born on September 28, 1927, the son of the late John W. Hodge and the late Bertha Hodge.

At an early age, young Hodge set his sight on a career in the medical profession. Thus motivated, he completed undergraduate studies at Tougaloo College, a private, historically black institution of higher learning in Mississippi. Subsequent studies at the prestigious Meharry Medical School in Nashville, Tennessee, "which boasts of growing its own unique brand of doctors" was next on his list of academic accomplishments.

Meeting the final requirements for his chosen profession, Ernest completed his residency at St. Agnes Hospital in Raleigh, North Carolina. A residency in anesthesiology was added to his developing resume for work completed in Cleveland, Ohio. In 1962 he joined the medical staff of the Katie B. Reynolds Hospital in Winston-Salem, North Carolina. When that noted institution closed Dr. E. B. Hodge brought his wealth of knowledge and experience to Forsyth Medical Center. When he retired from Forsyth Medical in 1981 he was Head of the Anesthesiology Department there. To the sum total of his distinguished credits, he was the first Black anesthesiologist in the State Of North Carolina.

The full measure of Ernest Hodge the man was found (in part) through his affiliations with the Twin City Medical Society and Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Incorporated. The essence of his Christian walk of faith was found in his membership at Mount Zion Baptist Church where he served a term on the Trustee Board. Until failing health prevailed, the joy of worship always resonated with him. Characteristic of the man he was, he always took a seat on a back pew in the church, never seeking to call attention to himself.
